

## Lake Manapouri/Doubtfull Sound

The day started early at half past six in waking up after a horrific night. The drive and all the experiences that came with the heat and the addition of something to drink, got me to go down with the flag very early the night before.


The day started with we sailed at half eight o'clock with the small ship. First, we sailed over Lake Manapouri, which would be New Zealand's most beautiful lake, but not in the weather, which this morning saw us on. After one and half hours of sailing, we were again on firm ground and were placed in 2 coaches and traveled 130 feet below ground surface. Down here came a little lecture on the construction of Underground Power Station and its function for the southern New Zealand. The station generates power for the equivalent of 62,000 houses.


Up on the buses again, up to the "surface" and out on a 26 km long drive when we came over Wilmot Pass and ending at Deep Cove. The time had now come closer to "None" and the clouds had suddenly split up and we started a 3.5 hour long cruise on Doubt Full Sound, where we would end up outside the entrance to Doubtful Sound from the Tasman Sea. Quite highly on a small rocky outcrops we saw the black seals and penguins guløjene.


At one point on the return trip from the Tasman Garden, captain sailed into a cubicle, turned off the machine and asked everyone to be completely quiet, now we hear "The Sound". Total silence, only the birds and the wind was heard. "The Sound" is when the wind blows onto the hillsides, creating tones due to the hillside nature, it was nice to experience.

Throughout the day started at. 8.30 and we were back to square one again at. 17th This evening's menu was consumed in Manapouris disused church that was converted into a dining room and information point for backpackers.


A truly amazing experience and yet a good day in New Zealand.















This day began very cloudy when we sailed across Lake Manapouri, but it would later be turned on.











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
After we had been the 130 meters under the ground an hour, we came up to overfaldentil excellent weather.

Pictured here is the Fisherman's House.











So we reached the Tasman Sea, where seals and many were staying.











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On the way home skipper sailed in between some mountain sides, where it was possible to hear The Sound.

## **Manapouri - Invercargill**

All the way down to the south coast run Mon to Fiordland continued snowy mountain chains on his right hand and gradually pancake flat landscape to the left.



This clip is from the town of Riverton few miles from Invercargill. The clip was taken at. 12 noon and the traffic is not overwhelming.












After I had landed in Invercargill, I did stop at the many parks the city had.









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
